

7th Annual Re-Purposed Doodad Sculpture Competition

Competition Guidelines *(revised 6/20/18)*

BACKGROUND

Hillsborough County Public Schools continues their partnership with the Tampa Regional Artists to provide K-12 students in public, private, charter or homeschool with the opportunity to recycle and re-purpose an object! Starting in 2011, plastic, street globes from the Horizon Bay at Hyde Park assisted living retirement community were re-purposed by Hillsborough County students, and transformed into creative sculptures. This tradition lives on!

GUIDELINES

ACCEPTED	NOT ACCEPTED
At least one aluminum can, at least one straw, and at least part of one map must be used.	No aluminum can, straw and/or map is used.
Aluminum cans can be used whole, crushed, or cut apart. Straws may be used whole, cut or shredded. Maps may be used whole, folded, shredded, or collaged. Cans don't need to be visible, but at least a part of a straw and a map MUST be visible.	No part of a straw and/or map is visible.
Other materials may be used, but MAJORITY of sculpture must be constructed of aluminum cans, straws and a map(s).	majority of sculpture is NOT created with aluminum cans, straws or maps
individual or group work with sculpture designed and created by students	majority of work completed by teacher or other adult(s)
in-the-round sculptures ONLY	hangs from ceiling or wall and/or requires electricity
in-the-round sculptures are no larger than approximately 4 feet wide x 8 feet tall x 4 feet deep	sculpture is beyond size limit
in-the-round sculptures weigh under 50 pounds	in-the-round sculptures weigh over 50 pounds
well-crafted and stable sculptures	poorly crafted/falling apart and/or unstable
original sculptures	plagiarized work or work that violates copyright laws
sculpture relates to theme	sculpture unrelated to theme
student(s) included an artist statement which explains sculpture's relation to the theme	student(s) did NOT include an artist statement and/or the statement doesn't explain relation to theme
